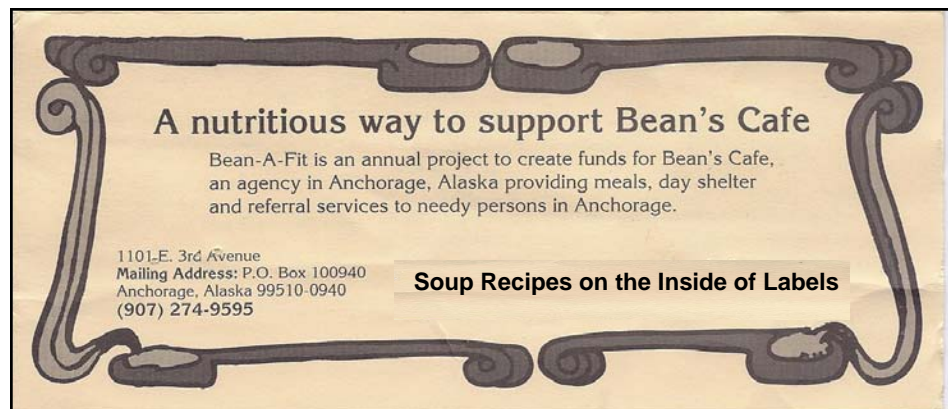

## The History of Flight



One of the big things in my faith and ministry journey this year is starting work on a Doctor of Ministry degree for my continuing education and professional development. It is a three-year program I am taking through United Theological Seminary. This process will take me to Dayton, Ohio twice a year, spring and fall, for weeklong intensive classes at the seminary. I may also need an extra trip or two, to meet with my faculty mentors and peers, which is also a requirement of the program.

Dayton, as many of you might know, is the home city of the Wright Brothers, Orville and Wilbur, inventors and builders of the first successful airplane, the Wright Flyer I. What many may not know is that Orville and Wilbur were children of Bishop Milton Wright of the Evangelical United Brethren (EUB), one of the two denominations, which merged to form the United Methodist Church. Bishop Wright is also the founder of United Theological Seminary.

Dayton is the birthplace of human flight. In December 17, 1903, at Kill Devil Hills, Orville Wright flew the Wright Flyer I for 12 seconds, traveling a distance of 120 feet. This monument in downtown Dayton, seen in the picture above, illustrates the height, distance and pattern of that famous first flight. And while it doesn't look like much of a flight for us modern day flyers, it is the forerunner of all our air travel today.

It's been said that upon observing that his sons were serious about their flight experiments, Bishop Wright sternly said, "Boys, human flight is of the devil! If God intended for us to fly, he would have created us with wings." Bishop Wright told his boys that human flight was not of God. But he was proven wrong. I think it is funny that it was in a place called Kill Devil Hills that the Wright brothers proved that human flight was of God and not of the devil. Imagine if they had listened. Imagine life without air travel.

This calls us to reflect on our own faith beliefs and theologies. What are the things, ideas, movements, practices that we have dismissed as "not of God"? We are reminded to watch our quickness to judge things as "of the devil", only because they do not conform to the standards and parameters of faith and life as we have come to know them. God is calling us to approach these new issues and concerns from more open perspectives. We are also reminded not to limit God and God's work to a box of set beliefs and worldviews. For God is more than the sum of all of these.

May we be careful not to quickly label things as wrong or "of the devil", for we might just be proven wrong. May God grant us eyes to see the world the way God sees it. May God grant us the wisdom to see what is of God and what is not.

# The Financial Health Report

Each month the Finance committee reviews and prays about the Church's balance sheets and discusses our fiscal health. This is nothing like the recent news and heated debate over government's budget, but there are times when we've been concerned over our financial situation. Luckily, or more appropriately, due to your dedicated giving, we are holding our own. We are meeting all our obligations, paying our bills and paying down the loans that financed last year's roof repairs and the cost of our 1999-2004 expansion.

Here is a year-end summary of 2011.

Budgeted Income	Actual Income
\$468,800	\$416,500

Budgeted Expenses	Actual Expenses
\$468,800	\$411,300

Building loan balance = \$776,590 (originally, \$1,300,000)  
Roof loan balance = \$ 16,000 (originally \$40,000)

The loan payments each month come in at just over \$11,000. The good news is that we've been managing month after month. However, that success comes at a price, especially in the area of maintenance.

And now, as we look at the proposed budget for 2012, we can see that watchful eyes and lots of prayers are still the order of the day. After collecting all the budget requests from the various working groups in the church, we had hoped to propose a budget totaling \$462,300. However, with pledged giving down for 2012, our projected income is only \$398,300.

What should we do? Fund raise a LOT of money? Encourage more giving? Actively seek more rentals? Find ways to cut expenses, especially on the needed repairs to the building?

Your ideas, suggestions, and help are needed. Talk to any member of the Finance Committee or simply drop one of those blue comment cards from the back of the pews into the offering plate, along your name, contact information and ideas. And we'll contact you!

Periodically, different (traditional or unconventional) components of worship may replace our ordinary order of worship, such as special music or drama, or just a different style of congregational prayer. We'd like to introduce more instrumental music as well. Do you play an instrument? Do you excel in drama? Would you do so in praise of God? Do you have an idea that would enhance the worship service? Let us know.

One oft-heard request has been to broaden music opportunities. We'd love to have more folks join the choir on a long or short-term basis. Perhaps you'd like to take part in or lead a children's or youth choir? What about a band or a hand bell choir? All it takes is someone to take the lead and gather like-minded individuals together. ## Local teen plans mission work in Tanzania

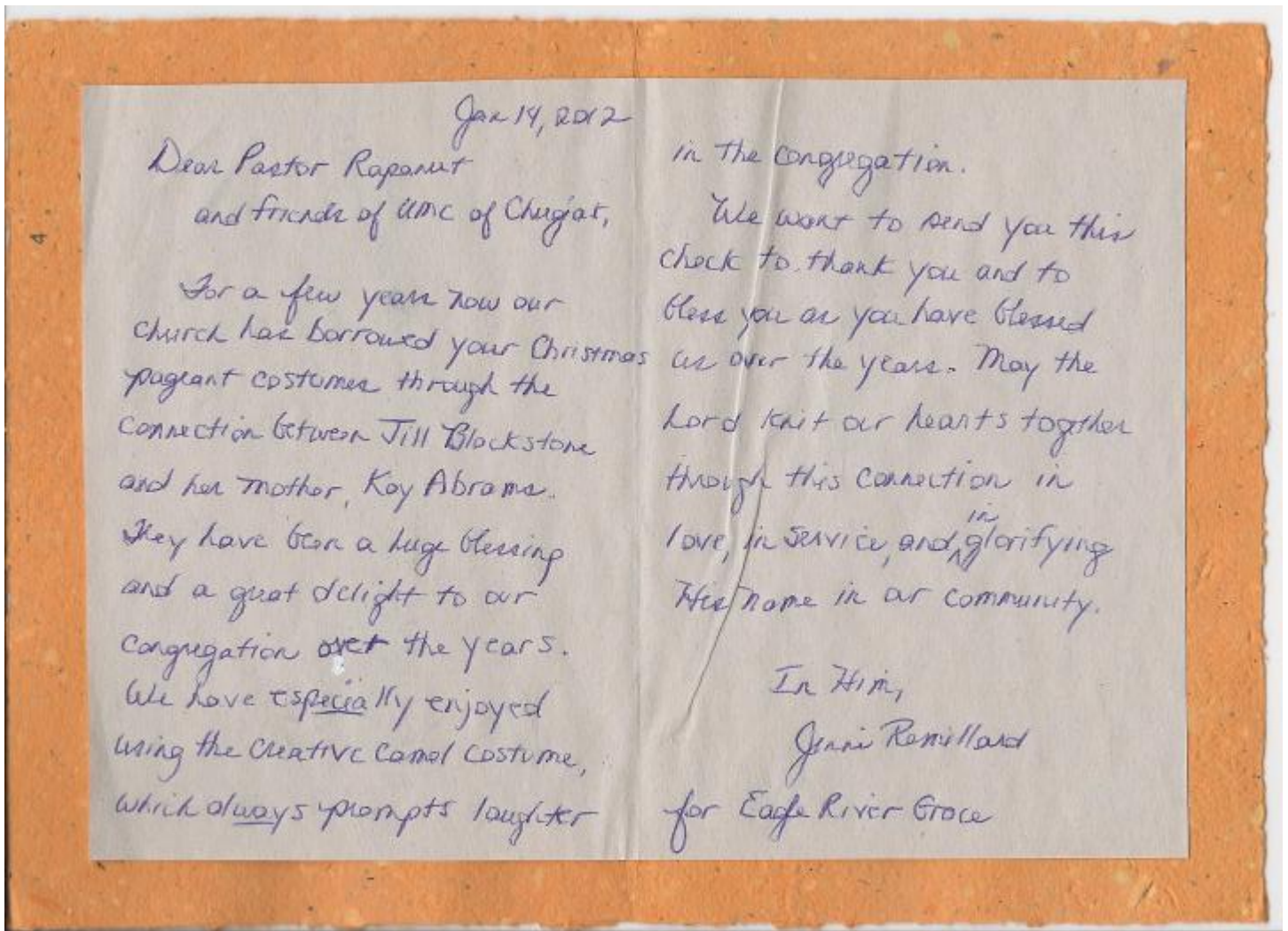

## Incentives that encourage youth in worship

You may have noticed on a Sunday morning that our younger teens are growing up. You notice because you see them serving in the worship services as acolytes, greeters, and ushers. It's a little chaotic sometimes as they rush forward to take the offering and then pause, uncertain, when they're not quite sure how to work with three instead of four people, but the Miracle of the Fourth happens every time! It's a faith-builder! Still, they take part enthusiastically and they take pride in doing their part well.

Over the years, our younger people have, from time to time, taken part in worship responsibilities; however, in the past two years, their participation has taken on a new fervor. In the Middle School Sunday School class, Kay Abrams offered an incentive. She offers "points" for participating: bringing soda cans for recycling (the proceeds pay part of the school supplies for Arame, our CCF foster child), correctly answering questions from the previous Sunday's sermon, and serving in the worship service. The class divides up into two teams each Sunday morning—it's a different division every Sunday—and they "compete" to tally the most points. What do they get if they win? Ummm ... mostly satisfaction and acknowledgement of their accomplishment from the other team. That's what may have started the participation in worship, but as they have grown accustomed to being involved, the teens seem to roll on their own motivations – points or no points!

When you see our kids take an active part of the congregation, give 'em a thumbs up. Let them know you appreciate what they do. Encourage them to take on new roles and show them how to do it. This will help them appreciate how adults take responsibility. Who knows? Maybe they'll get extra points for working with one of you. Cool!

## FORGIVENESS Game

Try this twist on musical chairs.

### What you need:

- 28 large index cards
- Black marker
- Two teams of people
- Radio or CD player

### What you do:

1. On index cards, write out *forgiveness*, one letter per card. Make two sets (two F's, two O's, etc.).
2. Mix up the cards and form them face up in a circle on the floor. (You'll have six blanks mixed in.)
3. Have teams mix themselves up and stand in a circle around the cards. Ask an extra person to turn the music on and off.
4. As the music plays, teams walk around the circle. When the music stops, players each pick up the card nearest them.
5. Team members take their cards to a designated area and try to spell forgiveness. Any double letters or blanks go back to the "music person," who reorganizes remaining cards, spacing them evenly into a fresh circle.
6. Play continues until one team spells *forgiveness*.
